The Tekoteko that stands at the top of the whare represents Tautahi the son of Huikai a great chief from Ngai Tahu. The Tekoteko is also symbolic of Henare Whakatu Uru, the man who gave Wharenui School it's name.



The wheku, which is the carved face represents

Tāne-nui-a-rangi, Tane who ascended into the heavens to obtain the three baskets of knowledge for mankind.

Tāne Mahuta is commonly known as the guardian and protector of the forests and all that dwell within, this paves the connection to Putaringamotu, Deans bush and all the streams that run through the area, he also goes by many names.

Tāne Te Waiora, health and prosperity.

Tāne Whakapiri, Tāne who brings people together.

Tane Te Wananga, the bringer of knowledge and understanding in the world of light, Te Ao Marama. The Maihi are the arms or the wings of the whare and also represent Ranginui, sky father.
